Visit to Crookwell Gardens

While there we all enjoyed a scrumptious morning tea seated around a blazing fire pit. Interesting is that all the cakes and slices were provided by Carolyn, the coach driver's boss's mother. The coach was rather large and could not turn around in the garden. the drive to collect us all for our drive to the next location. The next garden was just as big but not as formal, more lawn and tree based. After that visit we lunched at the Crookwell Services Club before ending the tour at the restored Stephenson's flour mill and then heading back to Goulburn. April Club Meeting

Doug Maggs from Growing Abilities was our guest speaker. Doug is a long time gardener. He previously worked at the Welby garden centre in Mittagong. In addition to being the largest retail nursery in the Southern Highlands, Welby Garden Centre also provides vocational training and employment to over forty people living with disabilities. Doug was sent by Welby to Goulburn to take over a similar site in Ross Street. Growing Abilities is a registered NDIS provider. Products sold in the nursery are similar to those sold in most nurseries and in addition they manage a garden maintenance team which includes mowing and hedging. Any profit made goes directly to provide employment, horticultural

training and social inclusion for those living with disabilities. Doug's presentation was followed by a questions and answers session.

Mary Whitaker, a new member, who was accepted for membership at the February Committee meeting, was welcomed to the club by President Lynne and received her membership badge and a copy of the constitution. Coach Captain Annette Cave spoke about the visit to Canberra in October and reminded members that when putting money in an envelope full names and date of birth must be advised. Following the meeting our guest speaker Catherine Watson from 2WP Tools took to the floor. The company was started 46 years ago by 2 German backpackers in Melbourne. The business was sold 6 years ago and is now Australian owned and based in Goulburn. Catherine demonstrated that 2WP tools are durable and easy to use. The garden tool range included the power ratchet system which reduces the effort required for easy pruning - even for those gardeners with arthritis, RSI or limited strength. Questions were asked by members and answers given. Following the presentation a purchasing frenzy ensued.

Winter is the time to get stuck into pruning. Use you 2WP secateurs. Tasks will be roses, fruit trees, hydrangers. wisteria and grapes to name a few. Feed your citrus and plant carrots, spring onions, leeks, broad beans, radishes, English spinach rubarbb crowns, strawberry plants, and peas. Since the growth phase slows down in autumn, this is an ideal time to move plants_that aren't thriving to another area of your garden, where conditions might be more beneficial. The growth rate of your lawn slows in winter, so set your mower at a higher level.
